Outside Speaker Evaluation

1. Identify the place you saw the speaker, the purpose, the duration of the talk, and the size of the audience.

I attended a speech competition at Pasadena City College on February 26, 2005. The speaker I observed was Samantha Tensee who spoke to an audience of 13 members. The duration of her speech was 15 minutes.

2. What did the speaker do to introduce the talk? How did they conclude it?

Ms. Tensee used the story of Kathy Reyes, an immigrant of the Philippines who came to the United States at the age of 11 months. Ms. Reyes, along with 65,000 undocumented immigrants, graduated from High School without an aspiration to pursue a career in college. Ms. Tensee concluded by stating that these undocumented immigrants also deserve the same opportunity as the U.S. citizens to pursue their dream.

3. What were the general purpose, the specific purpose, and the thesis? Discuss how transitions were used and organizational patterns of the speech.

Ms. Tensee's general purpose was to persuade the audience on the benefits of the Dream Act is about. The specific purpose was to persuade the audience how the Dream Act could make this country a better place. The thesis was to examine the problems of undocumented immigrants, clarify what the Dream Act is and is not, how the Dream Act not only impacts the undocumented students but also the American population, and to give solutions to the problems immigrants face. The transitions that Ms. Tensee used were excellent; before she would move to a different point of the speech, she would restate what she had just explain this is an internal summary, and then would transition to the next point of her speech. Her organization pattern was a persuasive speech following the Problem-Solution pattern.

4. Identify the main points:

The goals of this persuasive speech were as follow: examine the problems of undocumented immigrants, clarify what the Dream Act is and is not, explain how the Dream Act not only impacts the undocumented immigrants but also the American society, and to give solutions to the problems that immigrants face.

5. Identify three types of support they used being as specific as possible.

Ms. Tensee used "The National Immigrantion Legal Resource Center" to identify 50 to 65 thousand undocumented students graduating from High School with no hoper to go to college, and to indicate what kind of requirements applicants need to fulfill to obtain the Dream Act. She also used "Tolerance.org" d[[a]]ted September 21, 2004 to say that undocumented students came here to the United States as children and were raised her as their U.S. citizen friends. The U.S. Senate was also cited to present the statement that the Dream Act will grant initial conditional status to illegal immigrants for six years. Ms. Tensee was a extraordinary participant in this competition. Her vocal expressions changed according to what she was presenting. For example, when she would talk about problems or statistics, she made sure to emphasize what was important. Ms. Tensee paused when she would finish explaining one point and continue with the next point of her speech. The rate of her speech was good. She did not go too fast which made it easier to understand what she was saying.

9. How did the nonverbal language aid the speaker? How did it hurt the speaker?

Ms. Tensee's nonverbal language was good. She kept eye contact with the audience throughout the whole presentation. At some point she would keep eye contact with each individual. At the beginning of her speech she was standing in front of the room presenting her introduction and her thesis. Ms. Tensee moved to the left side of the room as she was moving along to different points of her speech. When she got to the middle of her speech, she started walking to the right side of the room. By the time Ms. Tensee had reached her conclusion, she had already moved to the middle of the room to finish her speech.

  - C. The Bill is carefully constructed to avoid the problem of encouraging more immigration to the United States.
    - 1. The requirements of the Dream Act limits the eligibility to very few people.
